Welcoming the new students to **RU 2010**

It is a great pleasure to welcome you to the Basic Studies in the Humanities/the Natural Sciences/the Social Sciences and the Humanities and Technology and to RU.

We have been looking forward to having you here and to your contribution to forming and reforming RU over the next five to six years.

You have come to a university that has managed to transform itself to reflect current requirements, but also to a university that boasts traditions and special characteristics that we are proud of. Some of these special characteristics are our basic studies, problem orientation and project organisation. Together with interdisciplinarity, these ways of organising studies have been RU's central trademarks during our nearly 40-year long history.

It is a well-known fact that RU has undergone many changes during its lifetime, and you will naturally also experience major changes during your three, five or eight years at RU.

RU will change, and the Danish educational policy will change as well as the terms for universities in society. Some of the steps to launch initiatives we will take ourselves; others will be launched from outside of RU.

Although some changes may cause problems, it is important to maintain that a university is changeable, and should remain changeable, and to insist that its scientific and educational traditions are respected.

A university should not be allowed to rest in a state of self-satisfaction. At RU, this is symbolised through our logo: The coral. A coral can only survive in roaring waves and flowing water.

Corals on the lee-side of reefs die where the water is stagnant, but do create a foundation. Therefore, RU's motto is: "In stillness death, in movement life." You need to help us secure the ongoing movement.

RU is a university known for its critical approach. – What is criticism?

Criticism is a fundamental element in obtaining new knowledge and understanding, because criticism means to encounter established truths with healthy scepticism and curiosity in order to assess their validity. To assess whether established theories and scientific understandings are valid, it is a prerequisite to study them.

A university is a place where learning and intelligence, and even wisdom, flourish. You have come to RU to acquire knowledge and learning. Some of the tools you will use are computers, teamwork and project work, courses and lectures; it is, however, important to remember that a university and a study programme include more than just that. Organising your own work and taking your own initiatives are important for your everyday life at the university and for the outcome of your study programme.

A university without inquisitive, active and demanding students is no university – it is a

drowsy school; this not only applies to the actual study work, but also to the student social activities. To us, it is important that you contribute to setting the university agenda.

Originally, RU was built for 2100 students, but even though the school has been heavily extended since 1972, we do realise that space is scarce for today's about 9,000 students. We have tried to distribute our available square meters to the best of our abilities.

I have heard that, when actually going to university, quite a few students at other universities say that they are going to school. On the face of it, I guess there is nothing wrong with calling a place of learning a school; however, it is important to understand that a university is a place where independent learning and understanding is an opportunity and where you take an active part in the learning process. At schools, teachers carry the responsibility, or at least part of the responsibility, for your learning. Here, to a much higher degree you are the ones responsible, even though researchers and lecturers share this responsibility with you. Studying is very different from going to school.

You will embark on your university programmes tomorrow. Today, RU says welcome and hello. Tomorrow, you will be part of RU. Our university also belongs to you – use it, and nurture it.

Why do children enter puberty earlier and earlier? Assistant professor in medical biology at Roskilde University, Kim Rewitz, might have discovered the key to the explanation in the fruit fly

Danish researcher discovers'missing link' in the

How the human body knows when to begin the transition from child to adult has long been one of science's great mysteries.

Now, a researcher from Roskilde University in Denmark has discovered an important link in relation to what initiates sexual maturity in fruit flies. The ground-breaking discovery might help us to understand the mechanism behind human puberty, and at the same time enlighten us as to why young people in the Western world enter puberty earlier and earlier.

Searching for answers for a century

The fruit fly is one of the most commonly used organisms when it comes to research within genetics and biomedicine, partly because of its short reproduction time and the fact that it is cheap to breed and partly because it is genetically simple and its DNA has been mapped. This gives researchers a big 'tool box' to help them answer biological questions.

A century ago, researchers discovered that there was a factor in the fruit fly's brain that could initiate sexual maturity. It was not possible to identify this factor, but it was certain that there was something in the brain that could trigger the process.

Kim Rewitz, assistant professor in medical biology, Department of Science, Systems and Models (NSM), said:

"Twenty years ago it was discovered what this factor was and that the molecule was a peptide hormone similar to a number of growth factors being produced and released from some nerve cells. It was also discovered that the peptide hormone affects the gland that produces steroid hormone, and they realised that, due to the structure of the molecule, this signal molecule from the brain had to be something that bound to the gland's surface."

"However, it was not possible to find the receptor of the signal on the cell's surface. We've been looking for it for 20 years, and now we've found it. It was a huge missing link in understanding the system involving sexual maturity", said Kim Rewitz.

The cells' receptors can be divided into different groups. The problem was that researchers had been looking at the wrong group of receptors. Kim Rewitz got the idea of looking at a different group of receptors after a stay onboard the Danish Galathea Expedition where he talked to some researchers from the University of Southern Denmark (SDU), who are experts in analysing proteins by using so-called proteome analyses that analyse the human body's proteins. The idea came from the subsequent proteome analyses showing that the way the hormone communicates with cells is the same used by growth factors in humans. Consequently, the hormone had to use a different group of receptors than previously anticipated.

"After I discovered the receptor, I spent eighteen months in the United States with two other researches, Michael O'Connor and Naoki Yamanaka, characterising it, and fortunately we had our results published before anyone else. It's always a bit nerve-racking when you feel you've discovered something pretty big because you know that around the world, there's a lot of researchers trying to discover exactly the same", said Kim Rewitz.

Early puberty

The results mean that, for the first time, we have an actual set of tools providing us with the opportunity to understand what initiates sexual maturity. Fruit flies' system is in many ways very similar to the system initiating puberty in humans and can therefore be used as a model. Hopefully, over time, it can help us better understand human puberty, which is still a mystery to researchers around the world.

A survey from the Department of Growth and Reproduction (Vækst og Reproduktion) at Rigshospitalet, Denmark shows that in Denmark puberty occurs a whole year earlier than it did just fifteen years ago. In fact, most girls develop breasts already before their tenth birthday. In recent years, the Copenhagen Royal Chapel Coir also has had problems with early puberty and voices breaking.

When puberty sets in too soon, it affects the body in many different ways. However, researchers are not completely sure on how, but they fear that the hormonal stimulation increases the risk of breast cancer later in life. Also, children with early puberty will often stop growing early and thus not be as tall as they would otherwise be.

One of the theories is that chemicals can alter the biological clock telling the body that now it is time to initiate puberty. Another theory is that obesity might be the cause of early puberty. However, researchers have not come so far that they can prove this. Nevertheless, it is an important step that we are now a bit closer to understanding what happens when fruit flies enter "puberty". The theory is that it is a similar process that takes place in humans.

"I hope that the results can help us understand the whole complicated system involving puberty and make us able to transfer some of these things to humans in the long term. Everything indicates that a high calorie diet can contribute to accelerating puberty. This applies to both fruit flies and humans, but we need much more knowledge about the processes taking place in the human body", said the Danish researcher.

Wait a minute... a Committee? Is it a Communist organization? No. The only thing in common for the IC and the Communist ideology is that they are both international. The International Club is a meeting place for people from all around the world. But back to the Committee – the Committee is simply a steady group of students who gather for minimum one semester and are responsible for office hours, arranging some events and helping the IC members arrange the events they want. This means that you can join the IC Committee for a semester (or longer if you are up for it – we are all-in for continuity) or for arranging a single event.

What has the IC actually been up to?

According to the current members, they've been out and about: "We'll help you to organize trips to many beautiful and interesting places in Denmark such as Bornholm, Møns Klint, Legoland, Jutland etc. By having monthly International Cafes at Gimle (not just another abbreviation but a meeting





place in Roskilde for RU students), we are giving you the opportunity to present your nationality, your national cuisine and music. Take a chance and show the others how you are partying back at home!"

However, there's much more. For instance, one shouldn't forget the yearly Crazy Christmas Cabaret in Tivoli, where if you are (un) lucky, you might end up on the stage in the middle of the play. We are still hoping that one legendary Christmas the person on the stage will be an IC member.

As mentioned one of IC's new initiatives last semester (spring 2010) was arranging a career workshop, where internationals working in Denmark shared their tips and tricks about getting a job in Denmark and experiences from their respective branches. This turned out to be a really popular event with almost 50 participants. As a nice extra feature, the participants could get feedback on their CV's from a Human Resources specialist.

Besides being a forum for social events, IC this semester established a new branch. It will concentrate on student politics and primarily represent students that are studying in English. As the number of international students is growing, the need for being politically active is becoming more and more important in order to maintain a good international environment at the university and empower the students.

So, what are you still waiting for?

In order to join the IC, the only thing to do is to come by our office close to the bookshop in Building 01, where we hang out on Mondays between 12.00 and 13.00.
